2011 was a very productive year with the revision and adoption of new By-Laws, the completion of an external audit of our finances, and the implementation of the highly successful Building Healthy Communities Conference; Bringing Health and Wellness to the Community Planning Table. Fay Matthews will serve as our representative on the Healthy Built Environments Action Group that has evolved from this. In addition the conference website www.buildinghealthycommunities.ca will be maintained as an ongoing communication vehicle on the Healthy Built Environment for those working in Newfoundland and Labrador.

In 2012 we have continued the work from our Strategic Plan. Our monthly teleconferences were reorganized to permit time for the Board to implement the work of the Association. The Education Committee began its work for 2012 with a slide show presentation at the March teleconference by Mr. Douglas Howse: New Chronic Disease Prevention and Management Policy Framework and the Provincial Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (Improving Health: My Way). The Membership Committee has been very active and over the next year you should see many of our communication tools for members revamped. Under the direction of Fay Matthews, Past President, the Nominations Committee will be recruiting for the new 2012-2014 Board. Member participation is what makes any organization strong. All members should consider applying for these positions.

Our advocacy work with the Canadian Network of Public Health Associations has brought recognition for Public Health to the Council of the Federation. In a letter to the President of the Canadian Public Health Association (CPHA) in response to our joint advocacy, the Chair of the Council of the Federation, BC Premier Christy Clarke, stated; "Premiers recognize that public health is a priority-not only because it improves the lives of individual Canadians, but also because it makes sense for all health care systems". We will continue to work with our partners nationally to advocate for improved public health capacity.

#### Who Needs Nature?

That was the title of David Suzuki's presentation at the CPHA Plenary session June 12, 2012. I remember Dr. Suzuki from watching the CBC's Nature of Things years ago. We could all learn from his use of plain language. These are some of his words of wisdom. "Everything is connected to everything else. We need nature. The environment in which we live affects who we are and how we develop. Healthy people need a healthy environment."

He went on to ask; what is the first thing we need when we are born. Any of us who have seen a delivery know the answer is air. Our bodies are composed of 70% water so we also need water. Our food comes from the earth and sunlight captured by photosynthesis gives us energy in our food. We are animals and our most fundamental needs are air, water, earth, and fire (sun). A healthy sustainable future must take into account these vital physical needs. In addition we are social beings who need love. We need communities that have social justice, equity, and safety (freedom from violence and war). We are also spiritual beings connected to nature with the knowledge of the forces we are dependent upon. However, we have elevated a human creation, "the economy", such that it has become the driving force that will destroy the vital things that we need to live-air, water, earth, and fire. We are undermining the life supports of our children.

He stated that a number of scientists now believe we have pushed ourselves to extinction. He stated he understood their positions but he felt we must have hope. He left us with the belief that there is still hope if we can pull ourselves together and rediscover that we are biological beings who need certain very basic things for survival.

I enjoyed his speech. I got up the nerve to request a picture for our newsletter. He thought I wanted a picture with him. But I stated I don't like having pictures of me and he stated he did not like pictures of himself either. For all of his fame, I believe that statement connected me to the real man who is not doing this for fame but as he stated at one point in his presentation, for his children and grandchildren.

# Canadian Network of Public Health Associations (CNPHA) June 11 2012



We talked about a need for a dedicated national Public Health Day. Such a public health day would give us an opportunity to highlight public health success stories and may also enable us to distinguish public health versus the publicly funded system.

We also discussed the need for advocacy around the proposed changes to the federal provision of health services to refugees. Subsequent to the meeting a joint letter was sent to the Federal Minister of Citizenship, Immigration, and Multiculturalism, with a copy of the Wellesley Institute report of May 2012 titled "The Real Cost of Cutting Refugee Health Benefits: A Health Equity Impact Assessment." This letter was copied to each Province's Minister of Health. Each Association also provided a brief report on their activities since June 2011. I was proud to speak to our two position papers from last year and thanked the Ontario Public Health Assoc.(OPHA) for sharing their work on infant feeding. I highlighted our second Strategic Plan, our new Communication Plan, and joint advocacy activities with CPHA.

The Network is really coming together. It is starting to accomplish what it was envisioned to do; provide a forum for the associations to learn from each other and work together.


